OBITUARY

The sudden death occurred on Thursday 3rd November, 1966, of Lawrence W. Mercer, the President of the Stafford-shire Chess Association, an office he had occupied for approaching twenty years.

He had attained distiction in many fields. He was Chairman of the Stone Council in 1962-3 and a County Councillor for Staffordshire from 1961 onwards. He began an insurance broker business in 1934 and had a number of offices throughout the County. His interests encompassed bridge as well as chess and he was a former Chairman of Stone Bridge Club.

His contribution to the chess world was in many ways unique. He played for the Staffordshire first team for a number of years and was always able to hold his own against the very strongest in the County. For the last 15 caght years he played for the John Thompson Chess Club on a high' board in the Wolverhampton League. He will, however, be best remembered by local chess players for his guidance in the administration of the complex County organisation. There are few ventures in the Midlands' chess world in which he has not played a part. As well as his County Presidency, he was President of the Midland Counties Chess Union from 1955-61 and his presence in this quarter healed mahy a rift and furthered many a project. He will be hard to replace, particularly at a time when those who are prepared to do chess organisational work are thin on the ground. Wherever he played or spoke he made friends and the loss to most chess players will be a personal one.

HOW MANY MOVES AHEAD DO YOU WORK OUT YOUR CHESS VARIANTS.

This question was once asked the late Czech Grand-Master Richard Reti. "Only one" Reti replied. There is a grain of truth in this. Quiet positions arise on the board where pieces have not yet come into contact direct with those of the enemy.

It is difficult to work out the whole chain of moves in such positions, and very often players really do limit their visual appraisal of the situation to a single move.

But there also are positions where everything is decided by far reaching calculations, to understand the laws governing the inter-relations of these chess pieces. In the cases a player can think many moves ahead.

In the game between Treibal and Dr. Alekhine in 1922 Alekhine forced a win with the help of a lengthy combination of the main variant of which he worked out at the board for 20 moves ahead.

Great skill is needed to work out even simple variants and lengthy calculations are mostly made in home analysis of adjourned games.

GRANDMASTER R. KHOLMOV. USSR.

Born 1925 he started his chess studies in the navy in his free time. Kholmov freequently penetrated into the secrets of the fine art of chess.

Soon the telented young man entered the chess arena in major engagements and passed with flying colours. At the age of 22 he gained the civeted title of chess master.

Kholmov took top prizes at the 1956 Dresden and the 1962 Bucharest tournaments.

In 100 the International Chess Federation conferred its highest title - INTERNATIONAL GRANDMASTER on Ratimir Kholmov.

He has developed most interesting style and is capable of conducting a lengthy stubborn defence, and then suddenly blowing up the position with the aid of an astounding combination.

Let us look at one of his games which unfortunately has not been popularised to the extent it deserves.

SIMULTANEOUS DISPLAY.

The climax of National Chess Week in Wolverhampton area was centred around the visit of Dr. Jonathan Penrose for a simultaneous display on Saturday 29th October 1966.

Several N.C.W. Committees of previous years tried to obtain the services of the British Champion for such a display but, for various reasons, had been unseccesful and the present Committee are to be congratulated on achieving this aim. It was good therefore to see all 30 Boards occupied and a few players in reserve if required.

In contrast to other notable players who have participated in this event, the progress of Dr.Penrose was slow and studied. He made very few errors and generally had the best of 90% of the games at the refreshment break.

The slow circuit allowed the Wolverhampton players more time for study and it was noticed that 21 boards were still in action when adjudication time was reached.

Of these at least half had a distinct material disadvantage but were fairly treated and adjudicated.

The final score was as follows:-

P 30 W 21 L 2 D 7.

The losses were obtained at the hands of Mssrs.J.H.Baines and D.W.Anderton. The draws obtained by Mssrs:Dr.N.Young, D.M.H.Evrington, J.D.Hughes, L.Armstrong,
J.Bargery, G.R.Link(Junior player) Miss M.Sedgley.

While a plus score of nearly 82% may suggest that the Champion had an easy passage, I tend to think that he was rather a little surprised by the overall strength of his opponents and this dictated the course of the ! . display.

Finally it is worth recording that both Mrs. Lloyd and Miss Sedgley, the only lady participants were still there at adjudication time and while Mrs. Lloyd was unlucky to loose, Miss Sedgley achieved a rewarding draw.

We have printed J.H. Baines and D.M.H. Evrington's games elswhere in this issue.
