

BEDWORTH CONGRESS.

The 20th Annual Bedworth Congress held in November attracted a record entry this year. At a time when there is a fall nationally in the number of congress entries following the surge of interest in the 1970's, the 5 junior sections were again well supported.

Derek Evans, the Congress Organiser is also a Regional Organiser in the junior training programme being developed by the B.C.P. and the Bedworth Congress provides juniors with the opportunity to play against strong opposition.

In the senior sections, the Candidates U.170 Tournament resulted in a four way tie, but the U.130 Major Tournament was won outright by A.B.C. Smith of Cannock Chess Club with a score of 5½/6.

You may like to discuss these with your sub-editors, friends and You may colleagues.

- Please use the small "1" and NOT the capital I when Please use the small "1" and NOT the capital I when having the ordinary numerals typed. Some typewriters do not have a numeral "one" on their key-boards so the small, or lower-case, "1" should be used. Any book on typewriting instruction will confirm this. Have a look through them at your public library. The capital, or upper case "I" is used for Roman numerals as in, say, Division III, VI, IX & etc., Mixing Roman and Arabic numerals as in, say, 1981 is wrong. Doesn't 1981 look right? The Club Match results (name 6) all had Roman IIs. which was unfortunate. (page 6) all had Roman I's, which was unfortunate.
- 2) Please do put a serial number on the new issue of the Bulletin this month. I would suggest: "Vol. 1, No. 2 (new series), Nov. 1981". I did you a long screed on previous Bulletin issues some time ago. It does make reference to back issues easier. For example, "A says "Did you see it in the last Bulletin?". "B" (who hasn't seen one for months) replies "Which one is that?"
- 3) I did think you would have had a short "Editorial", or introduction, or Notes from the Editor, or some-thing similar. Items in it:- such as your "deador introduction, or wores from the Balter, or something similar. 

In diagram 'A', Black to play and win


In diagram 'B', black to play - and win (in 8 moves)

Staunton

Howard Staunton changed from a career as a drama critic to chess at the age of 30 and soon become the leading player in London.

In 1841 he founded the "Chess Players Chronicle" and from 1844 onward he had a chess column in the London Illustrated News.

In 1851 he organised the first International Chess Tournament ever and was confidently expected to win it. The winner however was Anderssen. Later Staunton retired from competi-

tive chess but not from journalism, and he continued to exert great influence in chess affairs.

When Howard Staunton died in 1874 W.N. Potter felt it his duty to pen the following lines in the City of London Chess

"What was Staunton as a man? An old maxim has it that we must speak nothing but good of the dead. That may be all very well for epitaph writers, whose trade is to engrave lies on marble, but, for ourselves, we repudiate any such doctrine, considering it to be ethically unsound. Persons who wish to leave a character behind them free from reproach should earn it, and failing to do so, are justly open to the censure of the living. Praise given to all is rendered to none, and is, therefore a robbery of those is rendered to none, and is, therefore a robbery of those entitled to it. We have very little hesitation in saying that, in our opinion, the deceased often acted, not only with single lack of generosity, but also with gross unfairness towards those whom he disliked, or from whom he had suffered defeat, or whom he imagined likely to stand between him and the sun. His attacks...were often conducted in a manner not at all consistent with a truthful spirit; nor were his innuendees concerning Morphy otherwise than an utterly unworthy means of getting out of otherwise than an utterly unworthy means of getting out of an engagement."

The writer hopes he may never have to conceive it his duty to pen similar lines. Staunton was undoubtedly a chess bully of the square-headed, bull-necked type, and English chess was the sweeter and the cleaner for his passing. He was always treading upon somebody's toes, always making himself obnoxious and objectionable. The following paragraph. characteristic of the man, gave great offence:

"That preposterous custom of engaging an ignorant foreigner to edit Chess in an English newspaper makes us ridiculous where ever the game is known. Indeed the practice if not checked will shortly give to some half-dozen refugees a complete monopoly of English periodical Chess. You har no conception of the exertions these fellows have been making to get Chess into their hands." You have

No player of his time was more universally disliked.

. I was asked why we had to pay Corporation Tax, also, could we avoid paying the Tax in future?.

The World Championship

The World Chess Championship match staged in the sunny and sedate spa town of Merano, Italy is now over with Anatoly Karpov successfully defending his title against the Karpov, 20 years Korchnoi's challenger Vicktar Korchnoi. junior won the 18th game and so the match 6-2 in one of the shortest matches since 1921 when the great Capablanca needed only fourteen games to defeat Lasker.

Karpov Korchnoi

Korchnoi, who defected to the west in 1976, was disappointing to say the least, although he may well have been affected by the timely attack on him by the Soviet establishment on the day before the match was due to commence.

His son Igor is imprisoned in a Siberian labour camp for refusing military service on the grounds that it would make him ineligible to emigrate for at least 10 years. His wife had been allowed to visit their son a few days before the match, presumably to witness the sorry state he was in. She was then encouraged to telephone Korchnoi in the hope that she would convey the sad news of their sons pitiful condition. On the eve of the match the Russians released a 12 page attack on Korchnoi. They called him, among They called him, among other things, "a petty calculating huckster" who had deserted his family. The Russian strategy may have worked, for how else could one account for Korchnoi's dismal start to the match, losing 3 out of the first 4 matches. It certainly wasn't through any inspired play by Karpov.

Korchnoi once again had our own Grand Master Michael Stean as one his seconds. Also included in his entourage was a physical training instructor and two members of the Andand Marg Sect, the main one of which is an American girl Victoria Sheppard, known as Didi, who has been described as Korchnoi's guru. "Didi has a wonderful talent for making people believe in themselves" says Michael Stean. "Her sole purpose is to guard Viktor's Morale". It wou seem that her special talents deserted her at about the same time Korchnoi's morale did. Korchnoi jibes Karpov with phrases like "He wants to become a government functionary" and he regularly refers to him as "the Jailer" because he blames him directly for his familys plight. He points out that Karpov had enough influence with the Soviet Authorities to get his family out of Russia. Surely it would be humiliating for Karpov to win Russia. the championship against an opponent who was under such strain. "He is working class, 150 per cent Russian, and he knows how to appear submissive and humble" said Korchnoi at a press conference in Merano. "I am playing in hand-cuffs" he declared emotionally "In every game Karpov has two pieces more".

The players mutual dislike is well known. Karpov wanted a wooden barrier between them because he complained that Korchnoi kicked him.

Korchnoi wore special reflective spectacles to avoid the piercing stare of Karpov. They never acknowledge each other at the chess board or go through with the customary hand shakes before and after each game, Korchnoi had however been warned for speaking to Karpov during a game and threatened with a fine. Apparently he said something like"keep still you sniffling little worm" in his native tongue. All good, clean, honest fun.

The prize money amounted to £145,000 for the winner, Karpov, and about £82,000 for Karchnoi. With his share of the and about £82,000 for Karchnoi. With his share of the money Karpov will give some of it, as a spontaneous gesture, to the Soviet State. Informed sources reckon that the going rate for spontaneous gestures is two-thirds.

Karpov sent a telegram to President Brezhnev informing him that he had retained his world title and he thanked the Soviet leader for all his support.

The games themselves were hardly inspiring, perhaps the The games themselves were hardy inspiring, perhaps the best being games 15 and 18. Neither player came up with any new innovations in the openings, in fact on the contrary, Karchnoi, when white, always stuck to the well trodden paths after opening P-Q4 or P-QB4, whilst Karpov opened monotonously P-K4. All of the eight decisive games except for game 1 were won with the white pieces.

A selection of games

Game I Korchnoi began where he left off in Bagio City, playing the same opening as the final game there three years ago. Karpov had suffered one of his rare defeats at the hands of V. Hort only a few weeks before in this same variation. Korchnoi blundered on move twenty four, when he overlooked the stong reply 24... P-Q5. The last Dozen moves were played in a desperate time scramble by both players.






